HOW TRUSTED ADULTS CAN SUPPORT YOUTH



What is SEXTORTION?

Sextortion is a form of blackmail where someone threatens to expose sexual images or videos of another person to pressure them into providing additional images, sex, money, or other favours.

Who does sextortion affect?

Research suggests that:

Boys are more likely to be extorted for money and girls are more likely to be extorted for more images.1

There is a higher prevalence of sextortion among LGBTQ+ youth.^{2,3}

According to Cybertip.ca:

Reports of financial sextortion have increased by 150% since 2022.4

90% of financial sextortion victims who reported to Cybertip in 2023 were male.1

What are the impacts of sextortion?

Sextortion is a harm that is committed online, but it is important to recognize that it can result in serious negative impacts beyond purely online spaces.

Experiencing sextortion can increase the risk of negative mental health outcomes, including stress, anxiety, self-blame, depression, and isolation.5,6 Some victims of sextortion also suffer from suicidal ideation, and there are cases of some youth dying by suicide.

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How can I support someone who is being sextorted?

YOU CAN GIVE THEM THE FOLLOWING ADVICE:

Stop communicating with the person who is threatening you. We know this can be really hard, but research shows it can help.

Contact NeedHelpNow.ca to get support on removing a sexual picture/video. They can also help you send notices to offenders and platforms.

Do not comply with any threats. Do not send any money or more images.

Remember that if you agree to a sextorter's demands, this will often lead to more demands.

Deactivate your accounts, but do not delete your social media accounts or images because you may need them as evidence of what happened.

Take screenshots of the messages you received and/or exchanged with the offender and their profile, including their username.

Let them know if they are experiencing sextortion, they are **NOT ALONE** and there are resources available to them if they need help:

NeedHelpNow.ca provides information on emotional support, reporting, and how to help a victim with support services in your area (e.g., counselling, peer support, therapy).

Project Arachnid is a tool that helps victims have their images removed if they are shared publicly.

Kids Help Phone (1-800-668-6868) can provide urgent emotional support and help victims navigate whatever they are experiencing.
